Bellingham Revisited: U.S. Bankruptcy Judge Jim D. Pappas, Chief U.S. Magistrate Judge Candy W. Dale, U.S. Magistrate Judge Ronald E. Bush, and Professor Richard Seamon, Associate Dean for Faculty Affairs and Professor of Law, University of Idaho College of Law

The panel, moderated by Joseph Meier, Esq., will address the history, status, constitutional issues and potentially wide-ranging implications to the work of the federal bankruptcy courts and the federal magistrate judge system as a result of the U.S. Supreme Court's recent decision in Executive Benefits Insurance Agency v. Arkison (In re Bellingham Insurance Agency), 573 U.S. The Supreme Court addressed: (i) whether Article III of the United States Constitution allows Bankruptcy Judges, with the parties' consent, to enter final judgments on so-called Stern claims, meaning claims that the Bankruptcy Code designates for final adjudication in the bankruptcy court but that Article III – at least in the absence of consent – prohibits non-Article III judges from finally adjudicating, and, if not, (ii) whether Bankruptcy Judges may submit proposed findings of fact and conclusions of law, for de novo review by a District Court, on Stern claims. In addition, the panel will revisit the holding of Stern v. Marshall, 131 S. Ct. 2594 (2011), as to the characterization of core, Stern, and non-core claims under 28 U.S.C. § 157, and the potential implications of cases raising similar issues on the Supreme Court's current docket.
